

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My dear Parishioners,

What a strange week it has been. On Monday night last we were told that our Prime Minister, who was in hospital with Coronavirus, was admitted to intensive care. Whatever our Politics, our thoughts and prayers were being offered for him and for all Coronavirus victims. It truly is an anxious and worrying time for every country, every nation, every person on our planet. It is a time for personal care, for social care, for community care, for medical care of the highest quality, and for spiritual care. It is the spiritual care aspect that I wish to focus on in this letter to you.

Our faith assures us of the power of prayer. Time and time again in the Scriptures, we find Jesus Himself at prayer, and encouraging his followers to pray. Prayer can be very simple or very complicated. Prayer is simply talking, chatting to God, as we talk and chat to those we love. We share our inner thoughts, feelings, anxieties, our dreams, our hopes, our sorrows, our joys, our successes our failures with each other. Prayer is simply sharing those same thoughts, emotions etc. with the Lord Himself, with the assurance of our faith, that He hears us, inspires us, encourages us, and heals us, if not physically, most certainly with a spiritual grace, strength and hope. He did say "come to me all you who are struggling and I will give you rest". And of course, we always have those lovely prayers we learnt at out Mother's knees when we were children, or from our "simple prayer books". And of course we have a wonderful source of prayer in the Scriptures, and especially so in the Gospels themselves. Every word, every phrase, every sentence is a prayer in itself.

This Holy Week for all of us, has been so different from previous years. From the joy of Holy Thursday night with the Institution of the Eucharist, and the empowering of his Apostles to do likewise "in memory of Him", to the Cross on the hill of Calvary on Good Friday, with the passion, crucifixion and death of our Saviour; through the loneliness and emptiness of Holy Saturday; through the joy, the mystery of the Risen Christ on Easter Sunday. Sorrow, betrayal, suffering, crucifixion to Resurrection...hope, loneliness, rejection, ending in triumph, victory, everlasting celebration for us, and to us, every time we celebrate Mass, the reenactment of the first Holy Week, the means by which, and through which, the "fruits of our redemption" are applied to us, and made available for us. What love the Lord has given to us! What a precious gift he has left us in the Mass! How He still lives on for us, with us, and in us. Such love! That is why we say and sing "Lord, by your cross and resurrection, you have set us free. You are the Saviour of the world".
