## GOD'S UNCONDITIONAL LOVE FOR ALL OF US -

During my Reading this past week, I came across the following, written by an American Priest in his book on prayer. I thought it very powerful. It is basically about God's unconditional love. I share it with you for your reflection. I hope you will find renewed faith, strength and hope from this story.

The Priest writes: Some years ago, a man in his mid-thirties came to see me. He didn't ask for Confession, but he made one. He sat himself down and said simply, "Father, I want to tell you a story. The worst thing that could possibly happen to anyone has happened to me, and the best thing that could ever happen to anybody has happened to me. I have been to hell and back, and being in hell made me believe in heaven.". Tears flowed freely as he told me the story.

He was a married man with 3 children. His marriage was basically a good one, though he had been unfaithful. Unthinking, without prayer in his life, seduced by his own selfishness and the pressure of our culture, he had drifted into a sexual affair with one of his secretaries in his office. Initially he experienced very little quilt and continued on with his family, the Church and his work as before. "It was incredible" he confessed, but I was able to continue this with basically no guilt feelings whatever. In fact, I even believed that this was helping the girl involved and was making me a better husband and father."

Eventually the girl became pregnant. Even then his responsibility did not sink in. He continued as before. But she didn't. Returning from a vacation with his family, he found a letter waiting for him: the girl had written to tell him that she had an abortion, had guit her job, and had moved to another city. It was all over. It was then that the reality of his ways sunk in deeply and painfully. Before that moment he had felt little guilt. Now in an instant, he was overwhelmed by it. His world shattered. Guilt overcame him, and unable to see how he could ever again face his family with truth or trust, or ever again face God, or himself, he decided, though in a vague sort of way, to kill himself. With no particular plan in mind, he sat into his car and drove for hours. Eventually he found himself on a dirt track, someplace he knew not, having run out of gas. He got out of his car, and saw an old building nearby. It was an old, dilapidated church. Its doors were torn off. He walked blindly in the dark into the cold, dreary ruins. He fell

asleep and woke as the dawn was breaking. When he looked around, he saw the only thing left in the Church, a crucifix hanging on the front wall, He said "you know Father, I'm a cradle Catholic. I have seen crucifixes all my life. But before that moment I had never really saw one. I looked at that cross and I understood. I had been to hell and God never stopped loving me, even for one second". Then he added, "I'm not proud of what I have done. That sin will always be part of my past, nothing will ever erase that. But because of what I experienced in seeing that crucifix and knowing what it means, I can now live beyond it. I know now that God loves me, even when I am twisted and sinful. From that I draw strength to live beyond my sin. I know God. has forgiven me"

SCAFFOLDING IN THE FRONT OF THE CHURCH: If you have passed by the Church in the last 2 weeks, you will have noticed the scaffolding over the front entrance to the Church. As reported to you in a previous Newsletter, water was seeping into the Church, staining the back wall, and because of the dampness raising the floor boards in that area. Diocesan Consultants were asked to look at the situation, to report to us. The flat roof needed renewing and the coping stones around the flat roof entrance area were not sufficiently wide enough to off leak the rain, thus allowing the rain to seep though the bricks down into the wall, and causing the damage. Because the Church is a listed building, the stones had to be replaced in the same style and design, thus costing a fortune to do what would initially seem a straight forward replacement of stones. But not so. The work, including VAT. will cost approx. £22,000. Hopefully, because of it's listed status, we will be able to reclaim the VAT. in time.

<u>UPDATE ON THE PROPOSED LIGHTING IN CHURCH</u>: The latest update is that all going according to plan, it is hoped that work can begin in replacing the lights in Church at the beginning of June. Fingers crossed and hope for the best!!!!!!!

<u>FURTHER ACTION:</u> The same team are now busy making **RE-USABLE FACE MASKS**. They can be very easily hand washed and dried after each use. All masks are being made from new material.
