FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

We are heading towards Holy week and Easter. The Passion of our Lord looms, a week that will lead to the newness of Easter. Great things, new things! In our first reading God says he is doing something new. *Remember not the events of the past, the things of long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!.... Can you not see it? Isaiah looks forward to God doing something new and refreshing for the people of Israel in exile weeping by the rivers of Babylon; he says do not think about my past deeds, the great events when he freed his people from their slavery in Egypt through the crossing of the red sea, as if they were something past and gone. No, he will do a new deed: water in the desert, rivers in the wild where the wild beast will honour me. For the People of Israel it will be a new Exodus from exile. God always does new and refreshing things through the refreshing breeze of the Holy Spirit. As someone said he is the God of surprises. We might ask ourselves: have we forgotten this? I wonder have we become a bit stale and complacent, in a comfort zone.*

Complacency is seductive; it tells us that there is no point in trying to change things, that there is nothing we can do, because this is the way things have always been and will be. We have always managed to survive, get by. We “let things be”, or as others have decided they ought to be, perhaps. We let our past hang on to us. In Lent we are called to rethink our usual way of doing things; let us open our eyes and ears, and above all our hearts, so as not to be complacent about things as they are but unsettled by the living power of the risen Lord. This is being a disciple. In the Risen Lord, God has shown forth definitively that he is eternal newness. He impels us constantly to set out anew, to pass beyond what is familiar and accepted: he is exciting!

St Paul experienced the newness of Christ in his conversion. He was refreshed and renewed from his weariness of fulfilling the law and rules as a good Pharisee. For him now nothing can outweigh the supreme advantage of knowing Christ Jesus the Lord. The loss of everything is nothing; he sees his past as rubbish to be left behind. He wants to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and - I love this - such is the refreshing newness of Christ: that he wants to share his sufferings by reproducing the pattern of his death. He knows he is nowhere near getting there: he is forgetting the Past and straining ahead to what is to come. He desires only Christ and that newness of God which is stronger than all his sinful past.

In the Gospel today we see Jesus bringing that newness to the woman caught in Adultery. We do not know her story but only that she had sinned and been caught out in it. She expected the worse. However she finds a whole new beginning a fresh start in Jesus who says to her I do not condemn you go and sin no more. That is to say begin again, be refreshed, start out for the new. Such is the power of forgiveness that not only removes the weight of the past but opens a whole new way ahead. Forgiveness is always a starting point for new life. May we not go away with the Pharisees but kneel down before the Lord with the woman.

In these remaining days of Lent we must look forward to the coming days of great graces to be renewed by Christ. We rekindle our Penances with a view to the future the new and life refreshing action of God. As Saint Paul says we forget the past and strain ahead for what is to come. As Isaiah says: *See, I am doing a new deed, even now it comes to light; can you not see it? And the Psalmist: What marvels the Lord worked for us! Indeed we were glad.*

FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

One of my favourite stories from the Old Testament is when the prophet Nathan confront David about his adultery with Bathsheba and having told him the story of the rich man taking the poor man's calf, he says to him: You are that man!". As we have listened to the story of the Passion, we might be appalled by the behaviour of some of the characters such as Judas, Pilate, Peter, Herod, the soldiers, the disciples, the crowd and so on. Listening to the Passion we too stand accused: You are that man, Judas Pilate Peter. Indeed, the crowd as one man howled: *Away with him! Give us Barabbas! crucify him! We could debate who was responsible for his death, the Romans the Jewish leaders, the crowd but in the end this week we must recognise that we are. Our sins were the cause of Jesus death: he died for us. This must be the first recognition as we live Holy Week. I am responsible.*

However, there are other characters as well who was there during that week. Mary the mother of our Lord, Mary Magdalen, Simon of Cyrene, the Roman Centurion, St. John and the others. We too are those people in our lives. We are Mary Magdalene, reconciled sinners who remain faithful to the Lord to the end. We are Simon of Cyrene, helping the Lord — albeit perhaps reluctant at first — to carry the Cross. We are St. John, receiving Mary into our home. We are the Centurion proclaiming Jesus to be the Son of God. we pray that we can be a bit more like them in our Christian living. Instead of putting Jesus on the cross we are called to lighten his cross through our love of him particularly in our brothers and sisters who needs help in carrying their crosses.

During lent we have had some of the great gospels of mercy such as the prodigal son the woman caught in adultery. These have highlighted the call to repentance and the mercy of God. As Luke tells the Passion story, we see all the hatred that surrounds Jesus. All the physical, spiritual, and mental abuse he suffers with the mocking and the insults, yet he responds only with silence and the words: *Father, forgive them; they do not know what they are doing. He invites us to a true and deep sorrow for our sins so that we may hear those words spoken to from the Cross. As we read & meditate on the passion this week, we can come to that deeper sorrow or contrition which is inspired more by love of God than anything else. The words of the Passion Story can move us as we read them. The various characters can help us. It may be a short phrase that stays with us in our heart, and we repeat over and over in our heads and hearts during the week. But above all we lift our eyes to the crucified Lord. Maybe we look at him from our own cross whatever it may be. We reach the summit hear of the story as the Good Thief speaks his confession. He has been looking at Jesus from his cross and taking in all that was happening but above all looking and listening to Jesus. He has come to a moment of perfect contrition. What a journey! Perhaps he was rather like the other thief, but he has opened his heart to Jesus. He recognises fully his own sin and says yes, he deserves that he is getting. He has no excuses or mitigations but a frank confession. He then hears those most wonderful of words today you will be with me in paradise. The first Saint goes straight to heaven, and he is a convicted criminal.*

This weekend we enter Holy week. Indeed, we enter Jerusalem with Jesus. Our reading, prayer and meditation prepares us for our Liturgies when these great events are made present to us and for us in the mysteries of the liturgies we celebrate Palm Sunday the upper room with the last supper, the agony in the garden, Calvary itself and culminating in the new garden of Eden the garden of the resurrection. The liturgy enables us to encounter here and now, what Jesus went through then. In other words, we commemorate and relive during this week our own dying to sin and selfishness and rising in Jesus, healed, reconciled to God and each other, and redeemed by His death and rising for us. The three days of the Triduum, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter are the climax of our year and springboard for new joy and more through meeting our Lord risen from the dead.

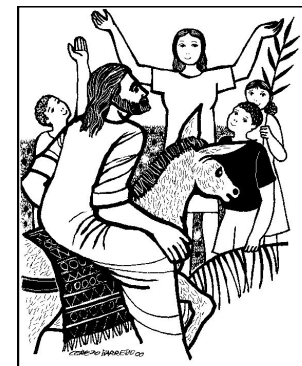

FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY: My dear People, I wish you the joy of today's feast: Jesus is risen Alleluia! It is wonderful that we can celebrate together in Church in a fairly normal way this Feast of feasts, giving praise to God for this wondrous truth of our salvation which has changed everything and indeed can change everyone. In the midst of so much anxiety, suffering and death in our world, we see that death does not have the last word but life. This is the word of hope we can share with others who despair, become cynical or indifferent, or those who have lost loved ones. God himself in his Son has shared our human condition even unto death, death on a cross. But God has raised him high and given him a name above all other names. The name by which we are saved and indeed the world can be saved

Our Lord has conquered sin and destroyed its power over us. We reflect on our world with the Pandemic and War which threatens Europe as well as countries in Africa and indeed in the Far East. We think of all the injustices that oppress so many not least the poor. The greed that threatens our planet.

Evil does not have the last word but love and mercy, despite what we deserve. In the risen Jesus we see that things can change even given the terrible evils committed in our world.

And as we should not despair of our world and always seek to make a difference in our world, little as our lives seem to matter; so too, we should never despair of ourselves. If there are things we have become aware of in our lives that we need to say sorry for, repent of, if there are people we should be reconciled with, now is the time. Let us make the purpose to meet our Lord in the sacrament of Reconciliation as soon as we are able. We can make a difference in our world through always living as Christians knowing that any act of love – no matter how small - shares in the power of the resurrection and is stronger than the evil around us.

The risen Lord brings new life from evil and brings in a new creation, in which all is now possible, not least he makes us anew in his image and likeness as the Risen Lord. All things are now possible that is our joy today! As the Church sings in the Exultet at the Easter Vigil:

The sanctifying power of this night dispels wickedness, washes faults away, restores innocence to the fallen, and joy to mourners, drives out hatred, fosters concord, and brings down the mighty.

Because in Jesus we too are risen. Through our Baptism we share his risen life. We are alive with his life which nothing can destroy or conquer. Hope is based not on human frailty but on Christ who lives never more to die and lives in us. Joy fill us, our Church, our world and heaven itself because the True the Good the Beautiful has won out.

We all love a happy ending to a film, our world is guaranteed a happy ending, even though we pass through dark times! But our suffering and difficulties through faith share in the cross of Christ and in doing that we share in his resurrection even now. AS the Holy Father said in a phone call to an Italian programme: *the Resurrection is not just a happy ending, it is the promise of love which helps us pass this difficult road... This comforts us and gives us strength*

I think it is something of this that always brings tears to my eyes at Easter the tears of pure and unadulterated joy. But there should be a deep joy that marks us always as an Easter people.

In Matthew's account of the woman at the tomb, they are told twice not to be afraid and that they would see our Lord in Galilee. As a sign of the truth of his words, he appears to the women. We too through faith encounter the Risen Lord much more than we know. In our world and lives, our Galilee, he is present for he is risen. At this time of suffering and uncertainty for the future he is with us: He says to us : Do not be afraid. We have his promise you will see me there in Galilee in your lives. The Lord is risen and alive and with us.

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love has no end.

Let the sons of Israel say: 'His love has no end.'

Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia!

FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

On this eighth day of Easter joy, we celebrate again Easter Sunday in the form of Divine Mercy Sunday. We have the wonderful account of St John of Jesus appearance on the 1st and 8th day. On each occasion Jesus greets his disciples with words of peace and shows them the wounds of his hands and side. The five wounds which identify him and he speaks words of peace. He then gives his Church the Divine power of forgiveness which belongs to God alone. It is miraculously given to the Church in the Priesthood particularly in the wider context of the whole Church which is sent to the world by the Risen Lord as he was himself sent. In the words of Absolution, we are sent to proclaim and make present "Pardon and Peace".

It is perhaps scandalous to so many that the church should have such a gift because of the sinfulness of its members and not least priests and bishops. Yet this is the first gift of the Risen Lord to us so that we may both receive it and give it. This is message we are sent to proclaim. In John's gospel Pentecost appears above all as the forgiveness of sins for which the Holy Spirit is received indeed, breathed out by Christ from the cross and today in the upper room. The World needs peace in all places whether in the wars it undergoes now or in our communities, workplaces and families and in our own hearts most especially we need the peace of forgiveness.

So, to start with we need to receive it like Thomas. He could not believe that there could be any future after the cruel death of Our Lord on the cross and lost faith and doubted. He would not listen to his fellow disciples who had seen Our Lord let alone the woman who had met him by the tomb or the two on the road to Emmaus. Perhaps Thomas could not believe that such evil as had happened in the Crucifixion of Jesus could have any redemption. Our Lord comes to him and offers his wounds to be touched. Thomas receives the forgiveness of Jesus and makes the greatest act of faith in our Lord as God. To be messengers of Divine mercy we must first encounter the wounded healer, Jesus. For us the ordinary way given by God is the Sacrament of reconciliation. If we have not been for some time, Eastertide is the time for it. What we call Easter duties. This is because it the time when Our Lord pours forth his mercy from his pierced heart. We all need it! We are invited to touch the wounded heart of Our Lord and God! As the Holy father said on Easter day in his Urbi et Orbi message: *His wounds are indeed ours, for two reasons. They are ours because we inflicted them upon him by our sins, by our hardness of heart, by our fratricidal hatred. They are also ours because he bore them for our sake; he did not cancel them from his glorified body; he chose to keep them forever. They are the indelible seal of his love for us, a perennial act of intercession, so that the heavenly Father, in seeing them, will have mercy upon us and upon the whole world. The wounds on the body of the risen Jesus are the sign of the battle he fought and won for us, won with the weapons of love, so that we might have peace and remain in peace.*

We must also share this Easter News with all. There is no one who cannot find forgiveness in the wounds of Our Lord for this he bears them, so that we might touch them. Many are paralysed by the weight of unrepented sin. It weighs them down and often they do not realise what it is. I know of a good Doctor of the mind who said to a patient what you need is not my help but a priest! (I have had occasion to do the opposite). It is something we need to be alert to in those around us. We must encourage people to trust in the mercy of God which changes our whole way of life. From pardon come peace. True peace is found in him, in discovering his sacrificial love for us. This Sunday is Divine mercy Sunday. It celebrates this freely given forgiveness. It is vital for all men and women and the future of the world. Pope Francis, a couple of years ago, quoted words of Our Lord to St Faustina in her diary: "Humanity will not find peace until it turns to the source of my mercy." Christ is our peace and healing. We need to touch his heart. We are specifically sent by Christ to proclaim this.

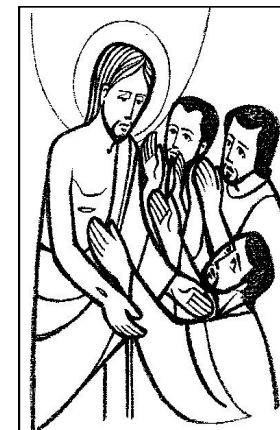

Today we celebrate **DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY** which has a particular poignancy for us all in the face of war in the Ukraine and other parts of the world which Pope Francis call a piecemeal world war and the continuing scourge of the Corona virus. Certainly, we must ask for mercy from God. That he will bring an end to this affliction. A most powerful prayer is the [Chaplet of Divine mercy](#). It Calls on our Heavenly Father to have mercy on us and the whole world in view of Christ's atoning suffering and death. *For the sake of his sorrowful passion, have mercy on us and the whole world is the refrain. Pope Francis used these words in his easter Address.*



Many people pray the Chaplet at 3 O'clock the time of our Lord's Death. This would be a most powerful thing to do: As Our Lord said to St Faustina: "At three o'clock, implore My mercy, especially for sinners..... In this hour, I will refuse nothing to the soul that makes a request of Me in virtue of My Passion..." (Diary, 1320). We can pray for an end to war and this pandemic. We can pray for the sick, particularly those who are without their family and dying alone. We can pray for sinners who are dying and need to repent. This is a great act of mercy.
