FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

Today both Peter and Isaiah experience the holiness of God as they are called to their missions, Isaiah as a prophet, Peter as Apostle and then head of the Church. Isaiah has a vision of heaven with the thrice Holy Lord God of Hosts. The repetition expresses an absolute the Holiest. Nothing greater can be said. Peter too is aware of the utter holiness of Jesus after the miraculous catch of fish.

This is the sense of Awe before God. The idea of the Holy is something or someone utterly different, other, separate unspeakably greater and indeed inaccessible to us. In the fourth Eucharistic prayer we praise the God who lives in unapproachable light. So, we note Isaiah's first reaction upon entering the presence of God is awareness of his sinfulness unworthiness and deep humility. "Woe is me, I am doomed!" he exclaims. "Peter says Depart from me, I am a sinful man." They are overcome. This is the sense of awe before God and his holiness that in some way makes us want to withdraw because of God's greatness but at the same time we do not because we are attracted to God and by God.

A religious sense of Awe or fear of God is good. We should have it in Church and at Mass because we are in a holy place and in the Blessed Sacrament, we are in the presence of God himself. We kneel before God in the Eucharistic Prayer much as Peter fell to his knees and we genuflect as we enter Church. Some people like to sit at the back of Church for this reason I hope!! I can remember this experience at a great High Mass when I was young. This has been called the Awesome mystery of God or "Mysterium tremendum". This is important for us all to know and experience. God is infinitely greater than us. But the joy is of course that we can only experience this because God communicates to us or shares something of himself with us. Good Liturgy and Church buildings need to communicate this. We are blessed with such a wonderful Church. Then of course we have our unworthiness because of sin. Peter is a sinful man. Isaiah is from a people of unclean lips. Paul himself is the least worthy Apostle. This sense of sin is again part of authentic religious experience. In God's presence we acknowledge our sins. Thus at the beginning Mass the priest says: *Let us acknowledge our sins, and so prepare ourselves to celebrate worthily the sacred mysteries. We recall our venial sins of the week (Serious sins have to be confessed). The eucharist and Holy Communion purifies us of these when we are prepared. Indeed, in the burning coal taken from the altar of God, which cleanses Isaiah's lips of sins, we can see a type and image of the Eucharist, which is also taken from the altar of God, and purifies us of venial sin when it is placed on our lips. The Eucharist is "burning" with the fire of God's love—it is, so to speak, a piece of tissue from the Sacred Heart of Jesus, enflamed with love for the world. It heals us of sin. Pope Francis often mentions medicinal effect of a Good Holy Communion. So as we prepare for Mass we should think about the holiness of God with awe and wonder and recall our sins what we have done and failed to do this last week. We are then in a good state to receive all the graces Our Lord wants to give us.*

Then we will experience that closeness of God to us, his utter nearness as Newman says: Heart speaks to heart. The Wonder of Our Lord who sits down at the table with his followers and gives himself as Body given and blood poured out and like St John, we can lay our heads on his heart in great peace and joy.

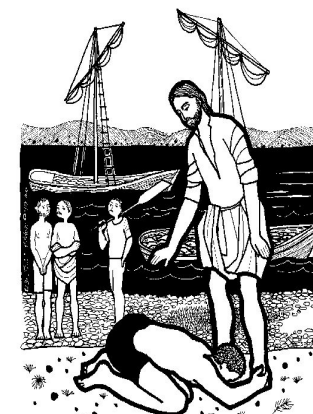

The Government directives have changed and we have received new guidance from the Bishops' Conference. We will be gradually adapting as the Pandemic becomes endemic. However, always in a safer manner as possible. Therefore we will proceed carefully with the transition to a more normal environment. The key protection is to be vaccinated: this means two doses plus a booster for anyone aged 16 or over. Some Changes

- You no longer need to book for mass. Masks are strongly advised for the sake of other people if though no longer a legal requirement.
- Stewards will no longer direct people to come up for Holy Communion. Simply Our Lady's side will begin and then we will proceed to the Sacred Heart Side. Please come slowly and leave a good space to the person in front – so that they do not feel there is someone breathing down their neck.
- We will maintain alternate benches. However there will be no limits to numbers on a bench though we wish to have a system which acknowledges people's wish to maintain distances. When entering a bench, if you wish to maintain a distance from those following you, please place your Mass/hymn books as far from you as you wish, to indicate your preferred gap. FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

We might say today that Jesus does not mince his words as he speaks. We might call the Beatitudes his core sermon that he must have preached many times and to different people and situations. Today he reveals some of the opposites to the blessings. The woes we call them. He speaks to a great crowd, but Luke tells us he had his eyes fixed on his disciples. **That is us!** His words are straightforward and direct. The Poor are Blessed even in the here and now. *Yours is the kingdom of God. Present tense. This is difficult to grasp as being poor is not good. We are told to help the poor. End Poverty and rightly so! Yet Jesus tells us the poor have an openness to the action of God and his grace. They cannot seek their consolation in what they have as easily as those that are well off. They look for meaning beyond the material. As Jesus fixes his eyes on us he asks us: where do you find consolation? Jesus words indicate a very real danger we have which gives him concern about us. If our consolation is rooted in what we have, then we are in trouble. This is not just possessions, but other worldly concerns as well. As CAFOD put it in their campaign – We must live simply. As Lent is on the horizon we should consider how we can be better rooted in God and how we can be more detached from our possessions. As St Ignatius might put it, we should be indifferent to them. I often think of Tolkien's Lord of the Rings where the possessor of the great Ring of Power is in fact possessed by it. However true indifference must include real simplicity of life. This is because we are one as body and soul. The two go together. The way we live as Christians must look different. Pope Francis reminds us that a way of doing this is of course learning from the poor and needy, sharing their suffering and helping them out in whatever way. The sacrifices we make open us to true consolation that only God can give.*

Jesus also talks about the external signs that are valued by the world: of prosperity, success, having a good time, being popular, satisfying our desires. These will not last. They are false comforts. The circumstances will be reversed; the last will be first, and the first will be last as he says elsewhere. Yet these things are pushed everywhere in our Society from every corner. To live as a Christian, to bring up our children in a true manner takes heroes! People will speak ill of us and they will. "hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man." We will be treated as the true Prophets were. But this is the road to life. We will have suffering now, the full blessings will come in the future with God, though we will enjoy peace of heart here and now. Indeed Jeremiah tells us that with deep insight. In truth, the one who is like a barren bush in a salt waste is the one who trusts in men and natural power ("seeking his strength in flesh"), whereas—despite appearances to the contrary—the one who trusts in the Lord is like a green tree that keeps its leaves and fruit even in time of drought. That is to say the one who trust who draws strength from God as the source of all life will endure the trials with faith hope and love because he looks forward to what is to come to what is eternal and lasts.

And we draw all our inspiration from the resurrection of our Lord as St Paul says: *But Christ has in fact been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. This is the guarantee of living a poor life, a true Christian life, witnessing to the future when the truth of man and woman will be unveiled. Now it is hidden perceived only by faith. We live out our lives in the light of the Reign of God which is hidden yet present. It is the true reality true success for us we can say. Then after following Christ in life, all good people will share fully in the transforming power of the resurrection. All will be changed and renewed in the New Creation with the Man and woman fully alive with the glory of Christ. Enjoying our fill, laughing and dancing for joy!*

FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

Today Jesus continues to speak on the beatitudes the great sermon of the Kingdom. He radically renews the Jewish law deepening it and the implications of blessed are the poor, those who mourn, the hungry. He tells us what it means to be a disciple. We said last week how we ought to live according to the Kingdom which only comes in fullness in the future but is present to us through faith and grace which crosses the divide and makes all things possible.

Thus we have the command: *Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly.* It is a command and not optional for his disciples. It is a key teaching, the summit for which we aim. We surpass the basic do good to those who do good to us or love those who love us. This is what Christ call us to. And yet it exceeds our abilities. We might think about extreme situations in which we might demonstrate this as the martyrs did who forgave and loved their persecutors and executioners. These are romantic dreams though not bad in themselves. However, what Jesus calls to, is to live it in the everyday of our lives. In the petty events of everyday which rankle within us. There is the falling out with a neighbour or when people or even friends gossip about us. Colleagues at work at work seek to undermine us or get ahead of us. It may be simply that somebody has ignored us or we imagine they have ignored us. There are countless examples in everyday life. And what do we do? We seek to get even, to have a little revenge Even if it is only barbed comments. However it can fester away in us and bit by bit we persuade ourselves that we indeed are provoked and indeed justified in seeking to get even. Yet we do justify such things in small ways; a little word spoken here and there, a little gossip spoken in retaliation for some hurt done to us or as is more often the case some imagined hurt. They deserved that we say. David could have felt so justified in our first reading. Saul from jealousy was out to kill him and indeed his followers thought that he should kill Saul when he had the opportunity. They felt that God had put Saul into his hands. He would not do it; he would not seek his revenge because he realised that to God alone belongs justice. It is not up to us to give that sort of justice and balance the books as it were because we will make them evermore unbalanced. When we try to make things even we are taking the power of God to ourselves. David would not do it. And it is not even logical if we think about it. There is too much envy jealous, distrustfulness not to mention hatred violence and injustice. We do not need more of the same but rather more goodness love and forgiveness. This is the only way to change things and this "more" which is beyond our power can only come from God. It came in Jesus who gave the "more" for us by loving his enemies all and sundry unto death to the last drop of his blood. He gives us Divine Mercy and asks us to share it which is the only thing that can overcome enmity by changing the human heart. As Jesus says we must pray for those who do us harm and seek to practice Mercy: *Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned.* Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure. In the very effort to practice mercy we will be given the gift of it. We will be given the gift of the grace to cross the divide between ourselves and living life according to the Kingdom of God. 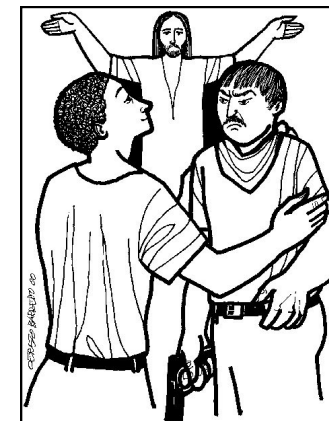

FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

As we look forward to Lent starting this week, the gospel today helps us to reflect on these coming weeks as we look forward to Easter to all the graces that the Lord desires to give us. The scripture today asks us to examine ourselves particularly in the words that we speak and then the word that we speak or think looking at another's faults. The parable of the plank in our eye and the splinter in the other's eye is wonderful. It is full of humour and indeed the absurd. But Jesus does that to drive his teaching home because it is so very important. He is teaching us to not look at the defects of others and criticise them, but to look at our own faults to look at ourselves first and foremost. We might say to ourselves I can't think of very many faults but we should seek to do so as Pope Francis once said: *"I assure you that if you don't realize that you have them here, you will find them in Purgatory! Better to see them here."*

It is so easy to criticise others. In thought and conversation. We join in conversations through egoism or just inertia. We point out the flaws of others so easily, joining in gossip. We excuse ourselves that they are harmless words. There is a saying: "sticks and stones will break my bones, but words will never hurt me." Words often hurt much more than sticks or stones. God created the world through words, and as creatures in the image of God, our words, too, have the power to create or destroy. We all know what we can suffer through gossip. Gossip does not end with gossip. It is a seed that sows division, enmity and indeed evil. Like a bomb, it can start a war. A war that can escalate in our families, in our neighbourhood, our work, our parishes, our schools. Indeed one of the places we have to be very careful is social media. I have seen things escalate very quickly on Facebook or twitter. It is so easy to write something or say something when we are not face to face. Of course, the opposite is also true our words can build up and create a wave of goodness peace and harmony when we speak well of others as much as bad words create division good words create unity. In that we share in the creative power of God.

So, it is important that we do not belittle our own faults. We need to look at ourselves in the mirror face on. We do this by asking for the Holy Spirit to reveal them to us. A daily examination of conscience and regular Confession is the effective medicine which could be a good Lenten resolution. When we examine ourselves, we look back at the day and in the words of the Confiteor – the I confess – we think about our sins: what we have done and failed to do in thought word and deed. We ask the Holy Spirit to reveal to us our faults and indeed that we may see them as grievous faults: we must see the plank in our eye as our Lord says. It is then that we can truly help others when in charity we point out someone's fault face to face which is the proper thing to do if we so discern God's will. However in doing this we never judge.

So an examination of conscience for Lent. How do I behave with people? How is my heart in front of people? Am I a hypocrite, I smile and then criticize and destroy with my tongue? Is it easier for me to see others' flaws than my own? Do I use words to build up? What sort of tree am I? These things we can bring to the merciful Lord in Confession. A grace filled Lent to all!
