FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY: Our Bishop recently reminded us of our 3 aims of encountering Our Lord, growing as disciples and as missionary disciples sharing our faith. We are now in this season of grace which is Lent through which we can become better followers of Jesus: i.e. holier Christians! As we heard last Sunday the call is to model ourselves on the Teacher who is Our Lord. We have 40 days when we can grow as disciples. We seek to grow closer to our Lord and in doing so to love those around us more selflessly. This is easy to say and indeed to desire, but we can be sure it won't be plain sailing! This first Sunday of lent reminds us of that as we come face to face with temptation. Jesus desires some time with his father to prepare for his mission and is himself tempted by the Devil. There is no doubt that he is going to do the same to us and test our resolutions. The last thing he wants is for us to come closer to our Lord and be better disciples, to leave behind our mediocrity. So we should expect a struggle as happened to our Lord. And of course, we have inner demons of our own weakness which we call concupiscence. When we try to control our appetites or desires, they seem to flare up with a will of their own seemingly. Our passion for food and drink for comfort, our laziness, the desire to satisfy our emotions, a certain listlessness. They can be unruly because we don't discipline them enough in everyday life. And when we give more time to prayer a mind seems to wander so easily and so often we struggle to concentrate at all. The devil uses these difficulties to tempt us to give up by saying so we're no good that we are hopeless and incapable of carrying out our resolutions and so indeed we are unworthy. He is the cunning deceiver as we know right from the beginning (Gen 3). We mustn't listen to him. The great encouragement for us today is the mystery of the temptations of our Lord in the desert. It seems amazing to say but our Lord himself was tempted; we can hardly believe it. It is a mystery beyond our understanding, yet it is true, a fact: we accept it and try and enter into the truth of it which can give us great comfort and help in our own temptations. I repeat our Lord was tempted. Through his fasting he suffered weakness of the flesh. His fasting was a means to come closer to his father. Thus the devil tempts him with some nice hot fresh bread we could say. Satisfy yourself he says. But Jesus replies: *man does not live on bread alone. This phrase could be a meditative mantra for us because it is key. We can repeat this to ourselves over and over again as we struggle with our disordered desires for food and drink and comfort and emotional satisfaction.* Jesus knew that and we ask him to teach us that truth that he too knew and experienced in his temptations. So too in the desire for glory and earthly possessions: Our avarice for possessions is a deceiving and temporary comfort. For Jesus it was a temptation to avoid the way of the cross the father had chosen for him. We too prefer the easy satisfactions and comforts. Then the final temptation of putting God to the test. The temptation to take the easy way the way of presumption that no matter what I do or don't do, God will take care of everything and sort it out. It is presuming on his mercy we effectively put God to the test. It is a product of pride and is spiritually suicidal. Certainly as we seek to be better disciples we will find temptations and indeed traps from the devil but we rejoice that Jesus himself has had these same temptations and he has conquered: he lived them for us and we live them in him and he in us. He is just close to us in our struggles and we share in the mystery of his victory over temptation.



FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

I hope Lent is going well. If not, it is never to late to begin. Today contrasts with last Sunday. Then Jesus underwent temptation in his human nature and had to struggle to overcome it. Today we see his glory revealed as he lets his divine nature shine through or perhaps better put, we see the Holy Spirit transfiguring his human nature, the same Holy Spirit we all have. Today we see our true nature shine through as baptised children of God. We received the Holy Spirit at Baptism and became children of God. The Father declared on that day, you are my child, beloved by me. That is our truest self, not the weak sinful person who struggles every day to be a good Christian. Lent is about taking to heart this truth and renewing our Baptism at Easter. This reality is hidden, we will only see it in the full glory of the resurrection, even though there are some holy people, we know, who already seem to shine with love. Living as a Christian is trying to be who we truly are. We may struggle to believe it but the Father attests to it.

The key to this is given by Jesus. He was transfigured when he went up the mountain to pray. It was whilst at prayer that this change came about. He was about to start the final part of his mission, heading to Jerusalem, to the cross. He wanted this moment to be with his father. He enters into prayer: and we are told that as he prayed the aspect of his face was changed in appearance: Here Our Lord was revealed in his prayer in his true self. He opens his soul to the Holy Spirit. As disciples seeking to live a Christian life, we too need this time with the Father. It is in prayer that we realise who we are and receive the grace and will to continue on our mission of life “heading for Jerusalem” with little steps of holiness each day.

We need this Communion with God. It was essential for Jesus to pray. His time of prayer was the very oxygen of his soul without which he could not fulfil his mission. If it was essential for him, it is for us. Without prayer we suffocate the soul, and we cannot live the life that we called to as Christians, because it all seems too much. Jesus could not have lived his life if he had not prayed. Just consider for a moment the agony in the garden.

Can we not find more time this lent to go up the mountain with Jesus? To find some time with God to make a little space in our busy noisy lives. We would never survive without the air we breathe, Yet we deprive ourselves of spiritual oxygen. Can we look this Lent at our prayer and make space: Fasting (from technology and noise) to spend time with God and each other to breathe in the Oxygen of God's love?



FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY: In lent we follow the history of the people of God in the Old Testament. Last week we heard about Abraham this week we come to Moses and the liberation of the people of Israel broadened out by Saint Paul's epistle. We come to a special moment in the journey of faith of Israel. Moses asks the name of the God who has promised to free his people. A name of course is so very important, to be able to call someone by their name makes such a difference. It is a sign of trust and friendship: with the name we can talk and share and understand someone. So what are we to understand by God saying I am who I am? On first hearing it seems to be a denial of the request or an evasion. There is some truth there because God can never be captured by a simple name. His being transcends names or categorisation. However, he tells Moses to say “I am” has sent him. Many see in this God saying that he is being itself, which is also true of God. He is the necessary being, the being that give existence to all that is. This is an interpretation drawing on Greek thought. However, God is not a philosopher here. He is coming to liberate his people from Slavery. He wants to reveal something of himself by giving his name. On one level he is saying I am present in your midst. The Hebrew sense of to be is not so much metaphysical as in existing but dynamic as in action and having effect. The name of God reveals him to be there for and with his people and that will be seen in the great liberation of his people from slavery and oppression. He is a God who is engaged with and committed to his people not merely existing. He desires friendship and trust and will make a covenant with them. The People of Israel will discover his name throughout their journey of faith as they see God acting in their lives and the drama of the whole nation throughout the centuries. They will grow in the understanding of the name of God. They experience his interventions in their history whether in the good times of faithfulness or in the times when Israel will be unfaithful to the covenant and experience the consequences of that. One of the lovely moments when God reveals more of his name I am who I am is when God speaks his name before Moses on Mt Sinai as he passes by: The LORD, the LORD, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, keeping steadfast love for the thousandth generation, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin. (Exodus 34). the name “I am who I am (Yahweh)” is mercy and grace, steadfast love and faithfulness and forgiveness.

This will be fully revealed and the name of God expanded in Jesus who is God Incarnate. What a name cannot reveal is manifested in the person of Jesus Through his life, death and resurrection. In Jesus we see God in action, the true meaning of I am who I am. We see in Jesus God Who has seen the affliction of his people and comes to deliver them from their oppression. Precisely the sin which is the root of all oppression. The Name of God as mercy is fully revealed. Repentance is the entry to know his name.

FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

Last week we reflected on the name of God and we reflected that we can only see him properly through the lens of repentance. Today we explore in the parable of the merciful father the mystery of mercy. Bishop Patrick said disciples of Christ are grateful recipients of God's merciful forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, so that they in turn may become instruments of that mercy and forgiveness to others. Our vision of the Father is very important. Who is he for us? Do we know him?

The Two sons in so many ways share in the same vision idea of their father at least at the beginning. Their father was simply I suspect a good father who brought up his children: there were rules; they had duties to do: their share of the work on the land on the farm, household chores, there were boundaries for their behaviour, certain things they could not do, they had to be back at a certain time: they both saw him as in charge a rule giver the one to be respected. Neither understood him. Perhaps some of you parents have had this experience with children.

One of them reaches the end of his tether and sets out: He has had enough. He demands his inheritance and departs: so much as to say as far as I am concerned you are dead. His father lets him go, giving into his demand. This reminds us love can never impose on the other, the son does not see this because he does not see his father's Love. He has his freedom at last he thinks! I can be free do what I want! We know how he ends up: after the initial high he ends up with nothing at all: hungry empty alone, no friends and no freedom. His dignity is gone as he ends up with the pigs the lowest of the low.

But we are told he comes to his senses: I love those words. He realises he is in a state. He will go back home. He does not expect anything but at least he might find a job at home. I think his saving grace is he has no pride. He has been a fool but, in some ways, a honest fool. He is prepared to swallow his pride. He sets off home: maybe in fear and trembling, expecting a severe scolding, maybe severe conditions, a coldness, a distance and certainly severe embarrassment.

It does not happen but rather a great big embrace. The first move is made by his father: he rushes to him meeting on the way, coming to him making his journey shorter. (He had his eyes on him all the time) It must have been quite a moment of revelation. A revelation of total unmerited, love that demands nothing but gives everything: he saw his father for the first time in a true light: he had been blinded by his selfishness. Only in this lens of repentance does he know his father truly: The father has not changed one iota. But in the embrace he realises the love of his father and see the very depth of his sin: **that he had thrown the love of the father back in his face. The love of his father has been unrequited all his life.**

The dutiful son: has not left home but neither does he know the fathers love. He only knows him as in charge and ungenerous. He does what he is told and would even see himself as a good person. He is owed something for his obedience. He cannot understand in the slightest what the father is up to in his unconditional welcome of the prodigal Son. He complains: you have never given me so much as a kid a small goat to celebrate with my friends? What I wonder here is: Did he ever ask? I suspect not (cf the word of the father: All I have is yours). Where are we on the spectrum of the two sons? More of the elder Son I suspect on my part. Have we asked the gift of true repentance? True contrition for our sins? Asked for a realisation of sin: what it means to God as revealed in Jesus: That is the thing I struggle with: a true sorrow a true deep sorrow that may be might make me weep, and mourn from the bottom of my heart. From that I may be a better disciple as the Bishop says. Have we asked anything of God? Something really, truly worthwhile: Perhaps open your heart to me, O God? The God who says: *all I have is yours.*


