#### FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY:

The People of Israel looked forward to the Day of the Lord which Isaiah talks about today. The day when God acts and comes to visit his people with salvation. It is often too called the day of Vengeance or retribution of God. We have both a day of salvation and a time of retribution in this reading where Good News is announced. Indeed this theme of Judgement, the Day of Wrath is often found side by side with that of the joy of God's saving his people. What to make of It? I has to do with the mystery of Justice and mercy of God. Through both he comes to save us as Isaiah says. Certainly, in all of scripture there is the theme of justice of God but also he is mercy made flesh as our Gospel indicates. Israel is often warned of the coming judgement of God if it doesn't repent and the disaster that would follow. But in the next moment as in today's first reading when the worst has happened such as the Exile to Babylon, he gives them the promise of his mercy of a new beginning - the day of the Lord becomes the day of salvation. Isaiah is not talking about physical healing but much more about spiritual healing. God had warned him that people would hear him but not hear see and not see. Words that Jesus himself would quote. Isaiah is looking to the gift of the Christ and the Holy Spirit. When God would come and help people to see truly to listen to God with an open heart and truly proclaim his wonders through the Holy Spirit. The Day of the Lord Comes with Christ.

Thus in our Gospel Jesus healing of the deaf and speech impaired man is a sign of the Day of the Lord present in Jesus. Of course, he has great compassion for the suffering of the man. We are told he sighed or groaned as he looked up to heaven. He recognises his isolation from society and more than that - his isolation from the Community of faith and God. He was unable to hear the Word of God and praise him with his lips. He touches and spits on him. This is an image of creation as Jesus makes him anew. 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' Hear the word of God and Speak it. As we say in the Baptismal Ephphatha prayer over the child: The Lord Jesus made the deaf hear and the dumb speak. May he soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father. The true healing of the deafness and muteness that comes from sin. It is the closing of the heart. The man can now hear Christ and praise him. The people say: 'He has done all things well, 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.', quoting the fulfilment of Isaiah whether they understood or not. The Day of the Lord was

It is present for us too and began on our Day of Baptism when we were created anew by the Holy Spirit. Be opened. Have we let that grace open our ears to his word and our mouths to proclaim his faith and love to others which is our mission from Baptism? For most of us it is an ongoing task and at times we have fallen away from it. Do we realize that we are still somewhat deaf? Does it occur to us that, as individuals (and as a church), we do not yet fully listen to the Gospel? Perhaps that is why we have a speech impediment and do not share our faith well and the people of our time no longer understand us when we try to proclaim the Christian faith?

Perhaps we need a little bit of that Day of Judgement or retribution in our lives. To be aware of the just anger of God with us and our world. How our sins appals him, not least our treatment of the poor or as Pope Francis says those on the peripheries. For then we might repent and the day of retribution then becomes the day of salvation. The Psalm today forms a good prayer if we can really pray it as people who know we are oppressed, hungry, blind, bowed down indeed imprisoned by our sin.

## FR CHRIS WRITES:

Dear All, You may have heard or seen in the press that the Holy father has called a Synod of Bishops in October 2023 entitled: "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission." The stated aim of the Holy Father that the Church in today's world should have a vision of missionary communion orientated to evangelisation However for the first time this will involve the whole Church over the coming two years in a more formal way. It is due to begin this October in local churches such as dioceses and then in Spring next year a national synthesis will be made. In September next year a first Instrumentum Laboris or working document will be produced which will be discussed on an Continental level Those 7 assemblies will then feed into a second Instrumentum Laboris for the Synod itself This whole process draws on the teaching of 2<sup>nd</sup> Vatican Council that the whole People of God in its universality enjoy the anointing of the Holy Spirit and thus have the sensus fidei - the sense of faith. This means as Pope bishops and the faithful together we are called to reflect on our faith handed down in the present circumstances of our world (not least after/in the Pandemic) according to our Charisms and how to share our faith with the world in which we live. As the word synod suggests, the essence of the Church is a Communion of faith that walks or journeys together evangelising the world we live in. This we could call the DNA of the Church. We hope and pray that the Holy Spirit will speak to us through each other and that we may all listen to him. As I understand it the first part this Autumn will involve us as Parishes schools and so on. This is all I know in respect of details. I will share more thoughts in the weeks to come.

One of the things we have started again is that our Eucharistic Ministers are taking take Holy Communion to the sick and housebound with all the proper precautions. If you know of anyone who is sick or housebound, please let me know. People sometimes get missed especially after this time of lock down.

There will now be Public daily Mass available. The Mass times will vary on weekdays depending on my duties and funerals and so on. **Always check the Newsletter!!** Please follow the instructions as below. We shall keep weekends Masses as they are with the same booking system, though we can seat people closer together if necessary. We are also thinking about the Thursday Coffee again!!

As we are now coming out of lockdown we do **need a Parish Health & Safety representative** if someone could volunteer who has some relevant background.

**Covid 19:** As you all know the Government removed regulations on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> July and from 16<sup>th</sup> August the contact Isolation rules change for the double- vaccinated. However, the Virus is still about and the rate of infection remains high. So we need to proceed carefully and slowly. This is the opinion of those whom I have consulted. With the Delta variant on the rise in our areas *Hands, Face, Space, Ventilate* is just as important as ever.

So we will still have to wear **masks** in Church as before: this is to protect all concerned and is an act of Christian charity

Mostly There will still be the 2m **social distancing** in Church., even if we can relax the spacing when necessary.

We will still **sanitise** hands as we enter and leave Church.

Stewards will operate at the weekend Masses with booking for Mass as we do now. However, **on weekdays** there will not be a steward. We ask people to sign in or use the NHS QR code. **It will be easier if people book in online on a weekday**. On a weekday we will alternate sitting: on the Sacred Heart side on Monday, Our Lady's on a Tuesday and Sacred heart on a Wednesday etc. If people could help sanitise the touch points after Mass that would be helpful i.e. the tops of the benches. I think we are now all accustomed to how to act in a safe way. We will review this every few weeks in the light of local conditions.
