FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS FOR SUNDAY

In our Gospel a Man is called to respond to Christ's call in a radical way by leaving all his riches and following him. We are told that Our Lord looked at him steadily and loved him. However, the man dropped his head, his face fell at these words, and he went away sad. When he heard the call to leave everything behind, it seemed all too much. He made the mistake of not looking at the face of Our Lord and seeing the look of love that he was giving. If he had, the call of Jesus would have made sense. He did not. We need to look at Jesus, see his look of love to be a radical Christian to be more than keeping the commandments - to be in love with Jesus. In prayer we intercept that look of love of our Lord. We do this particularly in the meditative or contemplative part of our prayer. Many struggle with this not least in a busy family and work life which is right and proper. Thus, God in his providence has given us the prayer of the Rosary. This developed over the centuries. At first as a way for the people working on the land could join in with the prayer office of the monks. sisters and clergy in the Church. It is no coincidence that in the Rosary as it was, there were 150 Hail Marys to reflect the Psalms which were prayed and sung in the Churches. Gradually the people adopted the prayers with a contemplative dimension as quotes of the Gospels were added to each of the Hail Marvs. Finally, after some hundreds of years the traditional form of the Rosary was codified by Pope Pius V in 1569 with the 3 sets of mysteries.

People throughout the ages have found in the Rosary a great aid to meditating on the mysteries of Our Lord's life through the heart of his mother. It has fed their souls amidst a busy day not just individuals but entire families. In 2002 Pope St John Paul II broadened the width of the Rosary with the Luminous Mysteries which take in the Public Life of Jesus from his Baptism to the Holy Eucharist. Now we can meditate on the whole of Christ life death and resurrection and the final glory of all the Saints in heaven and look into the face of Christ and intercept that look of love he gives us during the day. Each person finds the best way of praying the rosary. Some at one go as family (highly recommended by the Popes) or interspersed during the tasks of the day with a decade here and there. We all have intentions for our prayers, but we should take a moment to think about or picture the mystery we are about to pray. Maybe recall a line of the Story from the Bible or picture ourselves within it. The Rosary touches the whole gamut of our life joyful, sorrowful & ecstatic as we bring to mind all the stages of the life of Jesus If we let her, Mary will draw us in. For she always shows us her Son. The Rosary is a simple summary of the Gospel for every day. Pope Benedict said that this prayer helps us put Christ at the centre of our lives in this dispersive world and the recitation of the Rosary can help us learn the art of prayer with Mary's simplicity and depth. This is simply because she is our Mother given to us from the cross as a fruit of his sacrifice. As Pope Francis said we contemplate the face of Christ with the heart of Mary. She shows us the way to him who is the Way the truth and the Life. From the Cross Jesus places all disciples under her maternal mantle. She as a mother wants the very best for us. Above all to know and love her Son.



FR CHRIS WRITES:

As I have been mentioning the whole Church begins a Synod process culminating in 2023 with the Synod of Bishops and then an Apostolic Exhortation from the Holy Father. Pope Francis launches the world-wide Synodal process in Saint Peter's, in Rome this Sunday 10th October, which will be launched in all the dioceses on Sunday 17th



Hopefully, we will have some prayerful meetings. The idea is to walk together listening to one another but above all to listen to the Holy Spirit and discern where he is calling us as a Parish, Diocese or universal Church.

We are asked to begin this time with a celebration of Vespers with exposition of the Blessed Sacrament next Sunday afternoon(17th Oct). This will be at 5.00pm. We will discuss how we will best proceed at the upcoming PPC meeting on 18th October. The diocese has a series of guestions as guides for us to reflect on. We will all have to prayer hard that the Holy Spirit will speak and we will listen. We reflect on our present situation in the light of the Gospel and Tradition and indeed the teaching of the Church. Pope Francis says "what is under discussion at synodal gatherings are not the traditional truths of Christian doctrine. The Synod is concerned mainly with how teaching can be lived and applied in the changing contexts of our time."5 Therefore all topics can be raised but it is important to realise that not all will form part of the ongoing discussion. The Synodal Process is not about a democratic debate. What it will do is embed at all levels of the Church a new way of listening and hearing, of discernment and action which remains faithful to the truths received but expresses them in the context of a particular time. We need to hear from all. There will be a letter from the Bishop next week.

We Continue the month of the Holy Rosary This great prayer which is one both of contemplation and intercession. I suggest we pray it for the family, an end of the Pandemic and that the assisted dving Bill does not pass.

We will be delighted to welcome all who would like to join us starting 20 minutes before the Masses. Please try and pray the Rosary at home as a family.

There is a list on the Porch Table to sign up to lead the Rosary.

PRISONS WEEK: we begin prisons week this Sunday which runs from 10th October - 16th October. Please pray every day. "Respair" is an Old English word which fell out of use many centuries ago but means "the return of hope after a period of despair". The prayer tradition of lament helps us to make that journey from a dark place of pain, suffering, fear or sorrow to somewhere that the light can get in. Maybe only through a tiny crack to begin with but bringing a gradual dawning of hope and sense of God's promise, that we are loved and will never be abandoned or alone. COVID-19: We need to proceed carefully and slowly. This is the opinion of those whom I have consulted. With the Delta variant on the rise in our areas Hands, Face, Space, Ventilate is just as important as ever. So we will still have to wear masks in Church as before: this is to protect all concerned and is an act of Christian charity Mostly There will still be the 2m social distancing in Church back to back.. but we will be closer along the benches. We will still sanitise hands as we enter and leave Church. Stewards will operate at the weekend Masses with booking for Mass as we do now. However, on weekdays there will not be a steward. We ask people to sign in or use the NHS QR code. It will be easier if people book in online on a weekday. On a weekday we will alternate sitting: on the Sacred Heart side on Monday, Our Lady's on a Tuesday and Sacred heart on a Wednesday etc. If people could help sanitise the touch points after Mass that would be helpful i.e. the tops of the benches.
