THOUGHTS ON TODAY'S READINGS:

I always find it encouraging that in the Bible there are lots of feasts! Whether in the luscious trees of the Garden of Eden, the feast of the Covenant on Mt Sinai, the banquets of the Kings of Israel, and in the New Testament, Jesus presence at Cana, his meals with sinners, his parables as today, and then the promise of the Wedding Feast of the Lamb in heaven. These are images we should appreciate more as we have all missed so many feasts and celebrations during this Pandemic whether family ones or meals with friends or the great Feasts of the Churches year. I remember what a joy it was to sit outside with others for a supper after a wedding I celebrated in July. I began to appreciate what I had been missing.

In fact, Heaven is seen as one great wedding feast in which we are the bride and Christ is the bridegroom. Our Eucharist of course is a taste of that, of what is to come as we share, preemptively we could say, in the feast to come. What generosity of God, what mercy what unmerited goodness he shows us. What joy and wonder should fill as we celebrate Mass even if without the singing that we should have to lift us up!

Certainly, we see the generosity of God in today's readings. Even in the time of Isaiah we see the invitation to the feast extends to all peoples (which the Israelites failed to learn) and in the Gospel Jesus makes it clear the invitation goes to good and bad alike (and here we too fail to learn). The Church should be a community that invites all and is made up of sinners and Saints, as were Jesus's followers. We should not judge others or push them away. Judgement comes only at the end when God separates the wheat and the weeds. Rather, we should invite people in and back. Of Catholics who no longer come to Church, many do not come because they feel they are unworthy, that they are not good enough to be at Church. One of my often-repeated sayings is that we do not go to Church because we are good, but because we need God's help.

But what of the man without the wedding garment? There are many interpretations. The wedding garment was given out by the host in this case the king. He refused to accept it. We can refuse the generosity of God, mad as that seems. Also, the wedding garment is a standard Jewish image for works of generosity expected of every faithful Jew. Generosity covers a multitude of sins, I believe. It opens our heart to God's mercy despite our many failures. I have found great generosity amongst the down and outs. In Grantham, there is a charity, the Grantham passage, which normally provides meals for people whether a breakfast, supper or lunch. Amongst the clients I found a great generosity of mutual support even though they may be battling drugs or alcohol. They would help each other from the little they had. That will help them and heal them. Perhaps their own recognition of being in need and weak opened them up to the needs of others. What is true is that such generosity will cover a multitude of sins. May we be the same.
