Hopefully it will be accepted and approved in time for us to open for Private prayer only in the very near future. We have no idea yet as to when we can open for public worship or what conditions will be imposed on us. More on this when available to us.

Observing events world wide at the present time, whilst there are many issues and matters of justice, equality, dignity and respect for all God's creation, I wonder and ponder if somewhere along the way, we have lost our soul, our real focus on the Creator, our purpose of life here on earth, how we should, or rather must treat each other, and respect one another. Or is it just me beginning to reminisce, or to show signs of dementia in my growing more mature in age ??????

Like me, I'm sure many of you will have welcomed some sport back on our T.V. channels. Strange, almost eerie, without live crowd participation or atmosphere. But at least good to see some movement in that direction at present. I suppose little steps towards a life style we will all have to adapt to, in one way or another.

As I am preparing this Newsletter, there has been a Government announcement on a turnabout re. School vouchers for children during the Summer holidays. This has been largely brought about by the profile, personality, presentation and the young life experience of the Manchester United young footballer Marcus Rashford. I have been really touched by this, not because I am a Manchester United fan, but by the influence of such a young man who had experienced that kind of life and need. How lovely to hear him speak of his mother and her great efforts to raise her family. A hero on the football pitch – yes. But now a bigger hero off the pitch because of what he has achieved, and hopefully will continue to achieve and highlight the poor in our society, and influence Governments and all of us to be aware of the needs of others. And now for more spiritual matters and turning to our Mass Readings for this 12th Sunday in Year A.

Our 1st Reading from the Old Testament is from the Prophet Jeremiah Ch. 20: v. 10 -13 which tells us that the knowledge and faith to believe that God was with him, helped Jeremiah to remain faithful to the difficult task as a prophet, in spite of opposition and fear.

<u>Our 2nd. Reading is from St. Paul's letter to the Romans</u> Ch. 5: v.12 – 15. where St. Paul draws a contrast between Adam and Christ, saying that sin came to the world through one man Adam, just as grace and redemption came to the world through one man Jesus Christ.

<u>Our Gospel Reading is from St. Matthew Ch.</u>10: v.26 – 33. when Christ exhorts his disciples to openly and fearlessly proclaim and give witness to the Gospel and it's teaching, assuring them of God's special care and power in all their trials and challenges.

When Jesus sent his Apostles and Disciples out to teach and preach his Gospel message, he knew that they would be afraid, that they would be fearful of the abuse, the challenges and the physical attacks on their person. So, not just once, but three times he tells them "not to be afraid". It is normal; and natural to think that from time to time, we too are, and will be afraid to openly acknowledge our faith, our commitment to our Parish and our weekly Mass. Isn't comforting to know that many wonderful people, who have accomplished great things, also showed elements of fear in their witness and defence. To-day's first Reading from Jeremiah is a fine example. We know too that Martin Luther King had times and bouts of great fear. And so did Jesus Himself in the garden of Gethsemane and on the Cross at Calvary – "Father, why has thou abandoned me". Yes, its human and natural to show fear from time to time. But beneath that fear, hear Jesus whispering to you "Do not be afraid, know that I am with you...I am at your side". Do your best to humbly and prayerfully profess your faith, to defend your faith, and to live your faith. Remember that lovely hymn we sing from time to time "Walk with me O my Lord, through the darkest night and brightest day. Be at my side O Lord; hold my hand and guide me on my way.
