FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS ON THE READINGS:

"Sir, we would like to see Jesus." Our Gospel begins with this most beautiful prayer of some Greek Gentiles who have come to worship God in at Passover. So simple and powerful, it moves Jesus with both joy and foreboding as his soul is troubled. Joy in that his Father is drawing all people to himself but foreboding at the coming passion he must undergo. We are not told whether he speaks to the Greeks, but he points them to the place of encounter where they can best "see" him: on the cross when he is lifted up. There is where he is best known and seen as John says in the Passion: they will look on the one they have pierced. There is the heart of God revealed. Jesus reveals himself to all of us.

Christ wants everyone to find him, to see him, to learn to know his love and love him - that is why he became man in the first place and gave himself up to be crucified. The crucifixion exposes his heart for all to see - a heart blazing with so much love that it is willing to die for our sake, to suffer unspeakable pain and humiliation, the weight of sin itself in order to draw us to him. That is what is troubling him in the Gospel to the depth of his soul: the hour of glory with its terrible suffering as he takes on the sins of the world. He desires to do the Father's will by glorifying his name and to draw everyone to himself, but at the same time he recoils from it humanly speaking.

This is also described in our second reading in the letter to the Hebrews. Christ offered up prayer and entreaty, aloud and in silent tears, to the one who had the power to save him out of death, and he submitted so humbly that his prayer was heard. This is a description of the Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane and I suspect other times as well. He prays to the father to take away the Cup of suffering to come but no matter what he feels, he will submit to the Father's will of absolute love. As the Author writes in an extraordinary phrase, he learns to obey through suffering. He always obeyed the Father, but he experiences that full obedience in his human nature; he experiences all the suffering that came with that as he foresaw the horrors to come. Thus, he learned obedience. We must never understate Our Lord's full humanity. And thus indeed is he the "perfect" Saviour and redeemer who understands all our fears and agonies in life and death and how we too recoil from certain things.

May those Greeks inspire us to desire, to "see" him. That is perhaps our prayer for the coming days to look with our heart and soul on Jesus, to allow him to draw us to him, to give him some time and space in our heart. A few minutes of prayer simply reading some of the Passion narrative. We could go to bed a bit earlier and read or dwell on him as we walk along. It need not be lengthy as the Holy father often says but we need to give him our attention. God is never outdone in generosity. We can have in our minds and heart the Good Friday Liturgy when the cross will be lifted up and we will look on him. We aim for that moment.


