FR CHRIS'S THOUGHTS ON THE READINGS:

At the beginning of this Great week, this Most Holy of weeks, as we celebrate Jesus's entry into Jerusalem, there is a great exhortation that begins the Liturgy of Palm Sunday that is both urgent today and ancient in that comes from the Psalms the prayer of Israel. O gates, lift high your heads; grow higher, ancient doors. Let him enter, the king of glory! Who is this king of glory? He, the Lord of hosts, he is the king of glory. (Ps 23/24)

We are called to fling open the gates of our hearts, as individuals, as families, as a church as a world. The Lord desires to enter. That is the first thought. He is neither hesitant nor reluctant as perhaps we are. But neither will he force himself on us with power, and earthly glory, or even earthly wisdom. We are invited to let him enter. He comes humbly on a foal on a donkey. not with a great and splendid army but with his lowly followers, simple men and woman and of course the repentant sinners and lepers in tow.

There are great graces made available to us during these days. But his coming is easily missed such is his humility, so different are his ways from our expectations. Even in this time when it is difficult to receive the sacraments, the Lord will come to us in our prayer, reading and Meditation if we endeavour to live this week as best we can in the circumstances. How will we receive Him? It is good to meditate on the various characters of the Passion and put ourselves in their place within Mark's Passion story. There is Simon the leper who cannot understand the love of the woman who pours nard on the head of Jesus. The mysterious people who provide the donkey on Palm Sunday and the upper room for the Last Supper. Peter with his fervent avowal of faith, then failure and repentance. The disciples who cannot understand anything and the flee. We can imagine ourselves in the Garden of Gethsemane with Jesus which is a good one for Holy Thursday. What about the unnamed young man who flees? The false witnesses the Priests and Pilate and most disturbing the fickle crowd who from being cheerers become jeerers. The betrayal of Judas and his inability to repent and turn to Jesus for mercy? The reluctant Simon of Cyrene who helps Jesus with his cross. The centurion who had watched Jesus die on the cross and makes the greatest act of faith of the entire Gospel and last but by no means least the great women who stood by Jesus the whole way through. Do we dare put ourselves in the place of Jesus? What went on in his heart? Jesus enters Jerusalem this Sunday with one overriding desire for the week especially the last three days: to open his heart to us for ever on the cross that we may enter have life to the full. He speaks loud and clearly from the silence of the cross "I love you and always." His heart is forever open! Praise God! Thank God!
